What Is Comping?



Comping is playing chords using different comp rhythms. Think of comping as the piano version of strumming a guitar!

The chord is played with the right hand (RH), and the left hand (LH) plays a single low note (the same letter name as the chord).

Play chords with RH fingers 1, 3, and 5. (Thumb, middle finger, pinky.)


COMP RHYTHM:





T = HANDS TOGETHER / R = RH / L = LH


- First, **tap the comp rhythm** (using both hands) on the closed keyboard lid. Repeat several times without stopping.
- Next, play a **C chord** in your RH, and a lower C with your LH pointer finger.
- Add the comp rhythm and repeat as many times as you can without stopping. Don't stop at the end of beat 4; keep going smoothly!






WHITE-KEY MAJOR TRIADS










ADDING LH MOVEMENT

Play the **"1" "5" and "8"** notes with your **LH**. (The example is for a C chord.)


Next, play **"1–5–8" patterns** with your **LH**, starting low and moving up the keyboard:






Using the **accompaniment pattern** shown here, play the music below. **Your LH will play all 1–5–8 patterns**, while your RH plays the chord on beats two and four.





NUMBERING CHORDS

To easily communicate with each other, musicians number the chords in each key. In classical music and music theory, Roman numerals are used. If a student is not familiar with Roman numerals, they can use simple numbering, as shown below.



With your RH, **play the chords** above in a row; notice they're all-white-key chords.

Using these numbers, we can label each chord in any song. Then, those chords can be played in any key (using a different starting note).

A **chord progression** is a repeated series of chords, some of which have become standard. These are shown in the following pages, in the Key of C. You can also **try playing them in different keys**!

TRIVIA: the slang for a chord progression is "changes." For example, in a recording studio, you might hear something like this: "Give me the changes and I'll improvise." This musician wants the chord progression for the song.


